Burning Stubble, Dusting, Pays OREGON CITY—An active check conducted by Berg Brothers of Barlow, who grow and deal in Austrian winter peas and hairy vetch, shows that with one or two small exceptions, those who burned the stubble of their Austrian winter peas and dusted this year produced seed of high germination which brought a fairly good price, while those who failed to do so generally had seed

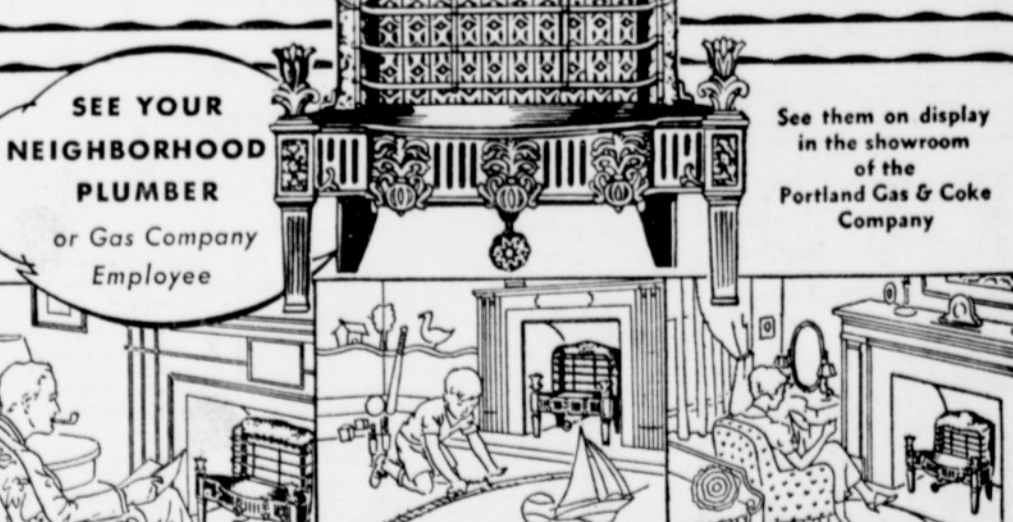
