

# Patterson Speaker at B. & P. Club Friday

Paul L. Patterson discussed the measure to be voted on at the coming election at the Business and Professional Women's club at the chamber of commerce rooms Friday night, and pointed out that the members should study these measures and make their own opinion. As he saw it the Grange Power bill is unnecessary in view of the fact that the government is building the Bonneville dam under supervision of expert engineers, when completed will furnish cheaper power for the state.

Sparking of the 20-mill tax limitation measure, he said that the bill carries it will curtail the terms of such an extent that only terms of six months or less could be held, and that it would probably close high tax-paying doors. # Health Project for Schools of County Adopted

Fourteen points essential for the good health of school pupils have been approved by the Washington County Public Health association and embodied in a project to be submitted to the schools of Washington County.

The following requirements were decided upon by the committee:

1. Have school grounds in good sanitary condition.
2. Have 90 per cent of the enrollment vaccinated for smallpox.
3. Have 90 per cent of the enrollment immunized for diphtheria.
4. Have one clinic or complete medical examination during the year. (Not including pre-school clinic.)
5. Have daily inspection by the teacher of some sort for health habits and cleanliness.
6. Have two health programs during the year, one for adults and one for children.
7. Participate in the seal sale.
8. Have a bubbler or individual drinking cups. Have individual or liquid soap.
9. Know the state health board rating of drinking water.
10. Provide toilet paper and paper towels at all times.
11. Maintain a school first aid kit.
12. Keep the temperature at 70 degrees with fresh air circulating.
13. Keep thermometer in room at height of children's heads.
14. Re-admit pupils to school after having contagious disease only by physician's certificate.
15. The above requirements be fulfilled by end of the seventh school month.

The project has been approved by Dr. J. B. Dinsmore, county health officer, and by the county school superintendent, and Miss Margaret Dixon, county nurse.

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
