## State Capitol News Letter

Consolidation Welfare Work Through State Thought Desired

SALEM—The next legislature will probably be asked to create a new State Welfare department to take over the functions now performed by the board of control, emergency relief administration, child welfare commission and parole

This is indicated by a report filed with Governor Meier's interim committee on public health and welfare by a committee of the American Public Welfare association based upon a survey of social con-ditions in Oregon authorized by senate joint resolution No. 13 of the

The report declares that "welfare work is a technical function of government, requiring trained person-nel for its administration" and recnends creation of the new department "with power to plan, su-

pervise and direct."

The present set-up for public work in Oregon is criticized in the report as out-moded, antiquated and entirely inadequate to the needs of the state.

should the recommendations contained in the report be adopted by the legislature a new board of seven members would be created to head up welfare work in the state. This board would be author-ized to employ a director of welfare who in turn would employ a staff of trained assistants. The proposed new department would be divided into three divisions which in turn vould be sub-divided into bureaus of child welfare, county organiza-tion, public relief, mental hygiene and handicapped.

Need for vesting greater discretionary powers in some state board authorized to invest state funds is seen here in a situation which finds the state with approximately \$2,500,000 in cash idle in banks yet compelled to borrow \$250,000 to finance unemploy-ment relief. Under an act of the second special session of 1933 unemployment relief financing limited to liquor profits and certificates of indebtedness issued against these profits. Plans of state officials to invest some of the state's idle money in these certificates, keeping the interest in the family so to speak, were quashed by an opinion from Attorney General Van Winkle holding that the certificates did not qualify for investment of state funds. ## County Budget for 1935 Shows Increase \$20,523 Over Figures Last Year

Relief, Old Age Pensions, Jurors Drawn Retirement of Warrants Cause Rise in Tax

Increase of \$20,523, or approxi-mately 7 mills, in the Washington county tax levy is proposed in the 1935 budget completed this week by the budget committee. Funds to be raised by taxation, according to estimates released, total \$395,911.04, requiring a levy of 16.1 mills on a valuation of \$24,606,953.90. The public hearing on the budget is sched-uled for November 30 at the Venetian theater in Hillsboro.

Taxes for general fund purpos during the coming year total \$155,-294.41, or 6.4 mills. This figure is a reduction of \$10,995.93 below that was cut \$2969.40 to \$93,778.50 or while the county road fund was increased \$34,488.59 \$146,838.13, or 5.97 mills.
