

Ferns Shipped to East Coast

Gribner Brothers of Banks Developing Business

BANKS—Gribner brothers are getting a carload of ferns ready for shipment to Chicago this week. They expect to ship out several more carloads of ferns for the holiday trade and will also start shipping holly the latter part of this month. Gribner brothers, John and Ed, have built up a fine business handling ferns during the past few years. They now have 25 people employed, five in their headquarters at Banks and 20 gathering ferns in the woods along the coast, near Vernonia and Sweet Home. At Banks they have a modern refrigerator plant and have also rented the S. P. depot at this place. The ferns, the sword variety, are brought to Banks in big bales. Those that are too dry are stood in water and those that are too wet are hung up so that the excess water can dry off. They are then packed, 2500 in a case. They are shipped out in refrigerator cars.
