Post Office Work Starts Here Soon

Federal Building Contractor Waits for Instructions to Begin Operations

Local Labor Planned

Many Other Projects Under Way in Hillsboro Area

Work on the long-awaited federal building in Hillsboro will probably get under way within a week, according to Joseph H.
