ON OREGON FARMS Three Squash Best in Trial PRINEVILLE—In a trial planting of several varieties of pumpkin and squash on the Dewey Shobert farm at Powell Butte, to determine their resistance to curly top disease, the three varieties making the best showing were Fordhook, Vegetable Marrow and Large Cheese, reports W. B. Tucker, district agricultural agent. Other varieties included in the trial were Blue Hubbard, Delicata and Umattilla.

Will Irrigate Fiber Flax SCIO—What is believed to be the first commercial planting of fiber flax under irrigation, in Oregon at least, is to be grown on the Ben Gooch farm here next year. Mr. Gooch, with the help of Art King, O. S. C. extension specialist in soils, is preparing 20 or 30 acres of land for irrigation, and plans to use a large portion of this for fiber flax. This crop has been grown experimentally under irrigation on the station farm at Corvallis for several years, Mr. King says, but he believes this will be the first commercial planting.
