

# Decorating of Home Topic at Coffee Club

# Value of Health Work Cited at County Session

A meeting of the health association was held at the North Plains school November 6. Mrs. Hugh McGilvra, resident of the association, gave an interesting explanation of the object of the association and the A-1 health school project. Miss Margaret Dixon, county nurse, explained in detail the progress in health rating made by various schools in the county and described the preparations most helpful to physician and nurse which can be made by a school obtaining a clinic. Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon tuberculosis society, gave a talk upon the beginning of the tuberculosis seal movement and the development of the work of the society in its effort to abolish the scourge of tuberculosis. She explained that 95 percent of the money resulting from the seal sale is retained in Oregon, the balance going to the national organization.

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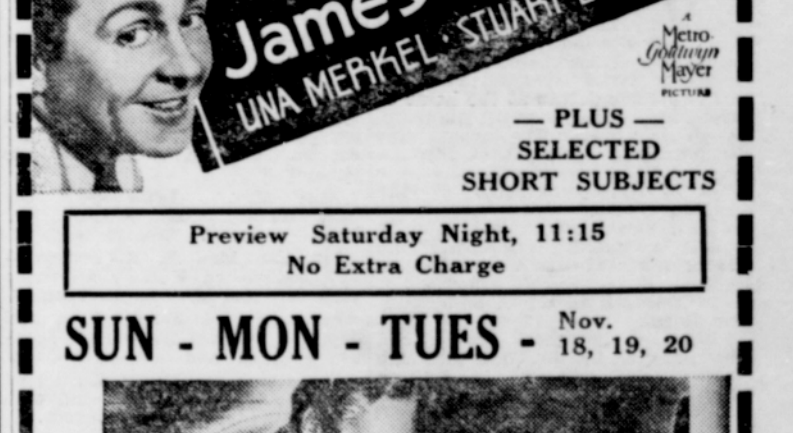
