

Hillmen Play Scoreless Tie

Tigard Holds Local Team to 0-0 Score Friday

Hilhi and Tigard gridiron eleven battled to a scoreless tie Friday afternoon on the slow, muddy Tigard field. The Hillmen held a decided advantage in every department of play, but were unable to sink their cleats in touchdown territory.

Hillsboro threatened to score twice during the tilt, driving to the Tiger 10-yard line in the first period and then uncovers an aerial attack in the final quarter that carried the ball to the 12-yard stripe as the game ended. Tigard was unable to penetrate the Hilhi defenses beyond the local 40-yard marker and gained but 57 yards on running plays to 177 for Hillsboro.

The only penalty of the game was against Tigard for offside. Defensive play of the Blue and White squad was outstanding, but on offense the locals proved poor "squadriers," being unable to get their running plays to click in scoring territory. When the game was called, it was reported that four seconds remained on the time-keeper's watch. With time left for one more play, it is possible that Hilhi might have passed for a score.

Grand Jury Drawn Here

New grand jury for the November term of court was selected Monday when members of the recently drawn jury panel reported for duty. Omar Peterson of Forest Grove was named as jury foreman while other members of the group included Layton Waits of Hillsboro route 2, Simon Hershey of Hillsboro route 1, Howard J. Hughson and Elmer Stipe of Beaverton, Louis Albert Reed of Gaston route 2 and Carl Clapham of Banks route 1.

Sentence of six months in the county jail was imposed upon Louis B. Holt of Hillsboro route 3 Tuesday when he pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge Bagley to a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Fine of \$25 was imposed upon Monday in the Hillsboro city recorder's court when he pleaded guilty to an intoxication charge. He was arrested Saturday.

Denying a motion to file a supplementary complaint against the Sherman Mill company to include 111 employees of the mill in addition to the two bringing suit, Judge Bagley Tuesday instructed receivers to examine claims of all employees and other claimants against the mill. Filing of a supplementary complaint was unnecessary, he held. The following day the receivers filed a report approving all claims for wages.

Longs Turn Out New Type Plane Cornelius Port

The current issues of both Popular Aviation and Sportsman Aviation have articles and photographs about the new Long airplane. The new ship is entirely different from anything now in use and has attracted hundreds of visitors to look at it.

It is of the low wing type, such as now used by the large mail planes, but the wings instead of being straight have a bend in them, similar to the wings of a gull or swan. This gives the ship several advantages, and it has proved to be very easy to fly.

It was built at the Long shop north of Cornelius, where several previous models were built. Much of the work was done by students of the Long School of Flying. Eastern experts predict that the plane may establish a new style in airplane building, but nothing definite will be known until better weather allows more flight testing.

Mr. Long states there is a move on foot to stop experimental work in Oregon, which would be a serious loss to the whole state.

Tax Payments Continue High

Approximately \$15,000 in delinquent taxes for the years 1930 and prior have been paid into the county department during the past week, bringing the total collected in a little over two weeks to about \$25,000, according to Miss Gladys Elmsner, tax deputy. Collection of personal property taxes during the first week of the collection period was \$16,000, she declared. Payments have been received by the county tax department on approximately 25 per cent of the properties listed as delinquent for taxes for 1930 and prior years, according to the district attorney's office. The foreclosure complaint which was originally to have been filed November 10 is being held up temporarily due to the large amount of delinquent tax certificates being redeemed. The complaint will probably be filed about December 1.

to 0 at the half but the "underdogs" staged a brilliant attack in the final quarter to win 12 to 10. Last year the Blue and White was considered several touchdowns better than Forest Grove but were only able to win 8 to 0 in the final period after being outplayed for three quarters.

Given a dry field and good footing, the locals have a good chance to upset the favored Vikings. The Hillmen are a hard-fighting, scrappy lot with an offensive featuring off-tackle line plays, a sparkling aerial attack and plenty of razzle-dazzle. They have shown a strong defense regardless of conditions but the offensive that clicks on a dry field is noticeably hampered by mud and rain. Offsetting this, Forest Grove has a heavy, veteran team that specializes in line smashes inside tackle and sweeps and lateral passes. The Forest Grove backfield consisting of Phelps, Hines, Britton and Bailey have a distinct advantage over Hilhi backs in speed, weight and experience.

Coach D. M. "Goody" Goodman will probably start Grogan and Samsel at ends for Hilhi, Mohr and Wunderlich at tackles, Peschka, Coslett, Cawse or Goodin at guards and either Stunkard or Goetter at center. In the backfield he will start any four of the following: Barr, Cook, Holscher, Torbet, Peterson, Kahlmeyer, Rice and Bronleeve.

Probable starting lineup for Coach E. L. Halverson's Vikings finds Storey and Sager at ends, Kappel and Nordgren at tackles, Benner and Schramel at guards, Hillis at center, Bailey at quarter, Britton at full, Phelps and Hines J. Fitzlaff, County of Washington vs. K. H. G. Co. vs. Hilhi, strong backfield possibility.
