Poultry Men Plan Meeting

Dr. W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist at Oregon State college, will speak on poultry diseases to the poultrymen at their monthly meetings which will be held at the Beaverton high school Tuesday at 8 p. m. and at the Forest Grove high school Wednesday at 8 p. m. Dr. Johnson is recognized as being one of the leading authorities in the country on poultry diseases and his discussion will be of considerable interest to the poultry raisers of the county.

A discussion of poultry diseases will be of considerable interest to the farmers of the county at this time as the pullitis have been or are being brought into laying and are subject to serious upsets due to some of the more common diseases, according to Mr. Francis.

It is also of considerable importance to the poultrymen to avoid having his laying flocks go into molt or for any other reason having his egg production drop off during the laying year. Consequently, it is essential that he have an understanding of some of the more common ailments that effect chickens and how to avoid them.

Concrete Safety Suggestion Given

A concrete suggestion for increasing the safety of Oregon's highways in connection with the effective elimination period of the "Let's Quit Killing" safety drive has been offered by Frank Shull, Multnomah county commissioner, and City Commissioner O. R. Bean of Portland, sponsors of the safety campaign stated this week.

One of the greatest dangers attendant upon night driving is the presence on the highways of cars with only one light, the commissioners said. Their suggestion to remedy this hazard is based upon a belief that often motorists with only one light are unaware of the condition, and would remedy it if they knew it existed.

Sponsors of the "Let's Quit Killing" drive have sanctioned the proposal offered to alleviate this condition, which is that motorists who observe oncoming cars having but one light make a practice of "blinking" their own lights to warn the other driver that one of his headlights is not burning.

approximately 800 cows in the southwest part of the county having been already tested and a considerable number in the east part of the county having also been checked. Dairymen generally seem to believe that the plan is one worth while taking advantage of and that there should be a benefit in eradicating this infectious trouble from dairy herds.

New SERA Projects Approved in County
Four new SERA projects for Washington county in addition to several addendas to existing projects were approved this week. These include clearing along the Beaverman drainage ditch, E. of Mt. Beaverton, supplying a cook-laundry and food for the Hillsboro nursery school, cleaning ditches along unimproved streets and flush-via storm sewers in Hillsboro, and widening several existing county roads.
