Eighteen Schools Serve Hot Meals

Eighteen schools in Washington county have reported to Miss Dixon, county nurse, the serving of a hot lunch or drink to pupils at noon. In some cases this consists of hot chocolate made with whole milk, or a hot milk or vegetable soup; in other schools the pupils bring their jars of prepared food from home and these are placed in a boiler of hot water and reheated for the noon meal.

Henrietta Harris, education director, advocates the hot dish at noon as a means of promoting a better condition of health and thus increasing the child's ability to learn and forming a greater resistance to disease.

The schools which have reported the serving of a hot food at noon are: Cicelyville, Jackson, Chapman, Middleton, Tualatin, Reedville, Johnson, Hillside, Buck Heaven, Farmington, Cedar Mills, North Plains, Buxton, Mead, Blooming, Hayward, Garden Home and Aloha-Huber.

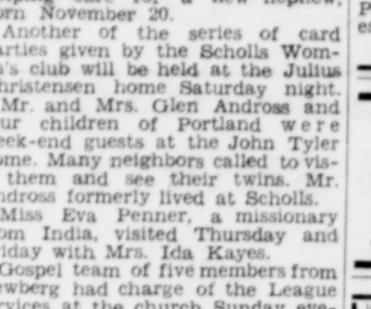
