

# Hillsboro Nursery Opened This Week

Hillsboro's day nursery school is now an established fact and opened Monday morning with a registration of eight. The school, which is an SERA project, is being sponsored by the Parent-Teacher association, with Mrs. J. L. Seary as chairman, and C. H. Nessler, superintendent of the grade schools, as supervisor. Miss Velma Benefield of Corvallis and Miss Peggy Peck of near Portland are the teachers, and a combination cook and laundress is also being furnished by the SERA office. School hours are from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m.

Six women's service clubs are co-operating in the work of furnishing the necessary equipment for the nursery, which will take care of 25 children when fully equipped. Organizations represented are: P. T. A., Mrs. Seary, Coffee club, Mrs. Fred Engeldinger, Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. J. B. Dismore, Business and Professional Women's club, Mrs. Fred Caldwell, Service club, Mrs. Arthur Reiling, and Needlecraft club, Mrs. E. J. Peterson.

Mrs. Seary expresses her appreciation for the splendid co-operation given by these organizations, and says that the greatest need now is for kitchen equipment. Housewives having good kitchen utensils not in use are requested to donate them for this purpose. Donations may be left at the David Hill school, where the nursery is located.

Crib, mattresses and kindergarten chairs for the school are being manufactured at the local SERA furniture factory, according to R. W. Weil, county reeve chairman.
