The 11 agricultural control boards, meeting in Portland last week, will seek the co-operation of the new state administration in a legislative drive to write a revised agricultural adjustment act into the state code permanently. Need for control of acreage as well as minimum prices was also brought out.

When the control board representatives met in Portland and added up the benefits of the adjustment program to agriculture they reached a total of \$2,-000,000. It was estimated that the income of melon and tomato growers increased \$400,000.
