Means of immunizing children to prevent various diseases, and child training were discussed by Dr. J. O. Robb at the Parent-Teacher association meeting in the David Hill school Tuesday evening. Vaccines have been perfected which are useful in warding off many of the contagious diseases. Dr. Robb told the parents and teachers.

Particularly he mentioned pre-ventive treatment for whooping cough, which causes more deaths among infants than any other disease; diptheria, smallpox and ty-phoid. A new means of preventing tuberculosis has also just been perfected, according to news dispatches,

he remarked.

Don't use too many "don'ts" in training children, Dr. Robb said. If Johnny is playing with pans in the kitchen or pulling magazines out of the rack, give him something to do rather than just tell "Don't," was the way he ex-

Parents should watch out that they don't smother the child's in-itiative by doing all the planning. Children should be given respon-sibilities and allowed to work out their own problems. If they make their own problems. If they make mistakes, they should be permitted to correct them without too much

Too much exposure of bare legs in cold weather tends to lower resistance of the youngsters, rather than build up their strength, Dr Robb believes. Plenty of orange juice, cod-liver oil and similar vitamin-containing foods are helpful. Sunlight lamps will soon become less Sunlight lamps will soon become less expensive and may then be found in every home, particularly in the Northwest where many days are cloudy, Dr. Robb said.

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
