Christmas Seal History Cited;

Most people think of Christmas seals as a decoration for Christmas packages or letters, or as the visible token of their participation in the battle against tuberculosis, but few realize that the seals have a reai monetary value to stamp collectors. These bricket With the seals have a reai monetary value to stamp collectors. Edward G. Olsen, a graduate of the Hillsboro schools and of Pacific battle against tuberculosis, but few realize that the seals have a real monetary value to stamp collectors. Those bright little stamps are the result of an idea which came to office at Copenhagen, Denmark As he cancelled the many Christmas letters which passed under his hands he would wish that he had a cent for every blow of his stamp. This wish produced the question as to what use he would make of those many pennies and he decide he would use them to provide comfort and nursing for some children af-flicted with tuberculosis to whom he read each evening. The next step was the visualization of a tubercu-losis stamp to be sold for a penny and he immediately began putting the idea into effect. By securing the idea into effect are approval of the Danish royal family his plan was assured of success and eventually a law was passed that such seals should be used on all Christmas mail. Einar Holboell, for this idea which brought forth such sums for the betterment of the health of the na-

Einar Holboell, for this idea which brought forth such sums for the betterment of the health of the na-tion, was twice decorated by the King of Denmark and also by the Kings of Sweden and Italy. Before his death in 1927 he saw the Christ-mans seals adopted by the govern-ments of twenty-six different coun-tries through their health agencies. These tiny bits of paper which meant so much were first brought to American's attention in 1907 by Jacob Riis in a magazine article written after he had noticed the seal on a letter received from Den-

The Christmas seals of those first years have steadily increased in value, until today they are worth many times their original penny, and a group known as the Christ-mas Seal and Charity Stamp so-ciety has been formed to facilitate the exchanging of stamps. 


