

200 Children Guests at Coffee Club Party

Childish voices piped "Silent Night" and "Jingle Bells" as more than 200 youngsters gathered in the chamber of commerce room Saturday afternoon for the Christmas party staged by the Hillsboro Coffee club.

Exclamations of delight followed as they unwrapped the presents which had been prepared for them. Members of the club had endeavored to see to it that no youngster in the Hillsboro school district went without a present for Christmas.

Long before the party was scheduled to start, children clambered over the stairs to the chamber of commerce banquet room. There they found a Christmas tree which had been decorated by members of the Hillsboro Business and Professional Women's club.

Soon members of the Coffee club appeared, carrying boxes heaped with toys. Murrainings of anticipation marked the appearance of each article. Finally Santa Claus appeared to lead the youngsters in two of their favorite carols. Then Mrs. V. W. Gardner, Lynn H. Dinsmore and Mrs. Victor Bryant sang more carols. Mrs. Fred J. Sewell played the accompaniments.

The boys were divided to correspond to age groups of the children. Babes in arms were the first to receive presents. Then toys were given little girls four years of age and under. Next girls from five to seven, then those from seven to ten and finally the 11 and 12-year-old girls received presents.

The same divisions for boys were observed. "We want to express our thanks to all the people of Hillsboro who helped so wonderfully to make this party a success," Mrs. Sewell, president of the club, said. "I hope I haven't overlooked anyone, but among those we want to thank are Nye Bristol, the Wells, Lester Ireland, Verne Baebber, Dr. J. B. Dinsmore, members of the Rotary club, the boys from Pilgrim house and the girls' groups that helped with the toys and their distribution."

One particularly touching incident followed the party. A mother appeared with her flock of little ones at the party and each child received a present. When she returned to her home she found a letter containing a \$5 bill to be used in buying toys for her children. She took her youngsters, each carrying the toy received at the party, to the home of Mrs. Fritz Abendroth.

"I know there were some children at the party who didn't receive presents," she said. "We will have plenty for Christmas now, so I want you to take these toys and give them to those who otherwise would have nothing."

Through some slip in the plans, some of the older boys had no presents waiting for them. Mrs. Abendroth took their names and arrangements were made to see that they were not overlooked entirely.
