Trichinosis is caused by a parasite in the muscles of pigs. This parasite may occur in large numbers in infested meat. As many as 1200 have been counted in a piece of muscle. It is estimated that the body of persons who have died from body of persons who have died from this disease may contain 5.000,000 to 100,000,000 of these parasites.

Trichinosis results from eating uncooked pork, usually in the form of sausage that contains larvae of trichinella spiralis. Heating the meat to 145 degrees Fahrenheit, the temperature used in the pasteurization of milk, will destroy the parasites. 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

Especially is this true if the piece of pork is quite thick. Cases of trichinosis have occurred from eating just such such inner portions of undercooked pork.

To be safe, no pork or pork products should ever be eaten unless it has been thoroughly cooked, and until all color disappears through the piece of meat.
