Farm Loan Body Reports Banner Year in County

New loans totaling more than \$500,000 were made through the Washington County National Farm Loan association during 1934, ording to reports submitted at the nnual meeting of the group Tuesday at the local chamber of commerce. Officers and directors of the sociation were all re-elected serve during the coming year.

Total of \$288,100 of funds from the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, for which the county association acts as a loan agency, and slightly more than \$250,000 of special emergency land bank comm funds were loaned in this vicinity during the past year, according to J. M. Person of Hillsboro, secretary treasurer. He stated that the as sociation had enjoyed one of its heaviest years during 1934 and that the rush of business during the spring taxed the capacity of the

Statistics quoted at the local meeting indicated that 539 loans had been made to farmers since the association was chartered August 17, County Exceeds 1917. Aggregate of these loans amounted to \$1,731,400. Collections on mortgages have been easier during the past year and money has been more abundant for farm purposes, Person declared.
