Bank Has Good Year
Bank of Tigard closed a good year December 31, according to W. M. Denny, cashier. Deposits amounted to \$45,000 during the 12 months to a total of \$239,524.22. While loans were a trifle lower than last year's, holding at U. S. government securities at \$62,726.57, were about double of those a year ago. The bank was 50 per cent liquid throughout the year. It earned 10 per cent net. Cash on hand due from banks totaled \$77,441.93 and together with government bonds and other securities totaled about 34 per cent of the total deposits. Undivided profits total \$181,699. Capital and surplus includes \$10,000 capital debentures which are subordinate to rights of depositors and other creditors, but no part of the capital debentures is expected to be used by the bank. Liquidating the Multnomah Commercial and Savings bank at Multnomah caused an increase of accounts at the local bank, swelling the deposits.

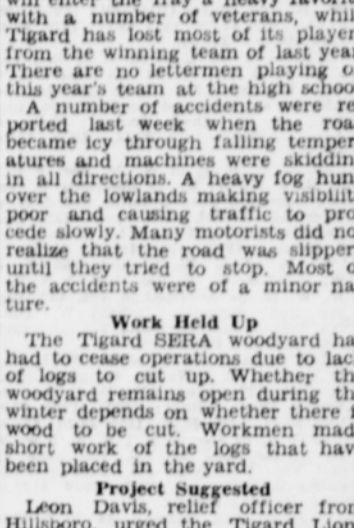
