A PPARENTLY, it is the easiest difficult to learn. All of us are apt to neglect the commonplace tasks and duties while aspiring to high enjoyments and adventures for which we are not quite ready.

Their minds were filled with large schemes and plans, and in the slight glimpses that we have of their life together, we have it made plain that they were not without worldly ambition or above discussing, even to the point of contention, which of them should be the greater.

T was under these conditions that Jesus had to train his sires or attitude? disciples in understanding the simplest and deepest things that exemplified in His own life and teaching. He represented a different order of values.

Greatness was not in place or distinction, greatness was in character, in love, in service. A man was mighty according to the things of grace and goodness that he was accomplishing.
