Teeth Needed

Oregon Editorial association executive committee has resigned as the regional code authority for the graphic arts code in Oregon, but in so doing voices its belief in the purposes and principles of the fair trade practices in the code. Such action it was pointed out was due to the cost of financing through the national code authority and in failure to secure cooperation from the national authority and from the NRA administration in Washington.

When NRA went into effect in August, 1933, everyone was for it and it was not in any sense of hysteria but rather in the belief that through some degree of rigid federal control certain unfair praceryone felt that they would "have to toe the mark" and they wanted to do so along with their competitors. As time went on the lack of teeth and ability to enforce promoted a new type of bootlegger, the one who would use every conceivable means to break the codes and get an unfair advantage over sincere and conscientious business people co-operating 100 per cent with the recovery program of the administration and with their fellow busi-

business recovery. If (and we feel it should) a permanent NRA is worked out by this session of congress to take the place of the act that will expire June 15 it should have the force of law and the necessary teeth to keep the "rotten apples" in business from spreading their rot to the sound elements and gradually bringing down all commerce to the low level that will create wholesale bankruptcy and chaos. Labor and hour provisions under such viciousness most certainly would break along with it.

The state legislature is considering a state NRA act. A good, strong law with teeth tying in with the national and one that might be better administered through co-operative local effort in industry should be worked out and without any thought of political lines. It is a problem that cannot be considered on a partisan basis.

Although the regional code authority has resigned national graphic arts code is still in effect. Being somewhat idealistic we cannot help but feel that anything that has so much of good and from reports throughout the nation has had such beneficial effects in bringing us back on the road to recovery cannot die out. It may be sick for a time but the right and good should eventually prevail.
