

Retiring Officers of City Honored Here

Honoring members of the city administration who retired from office on the first of the year, the city had a luncheon at the city hall on Tuesday afternoon sponsored by a dinner reception here Monday evening. Short talks by honor guests, a surprise event and cards featured the program.

P. L. Patterson, vice-president of the chamber of commerce who presided in the absence of H. L. MacKenzie, president, who has been in several days, lauded the record of the retiring mayor and councilmen. He cited the fact that the city had been retained on a cash basis during the depression and called attention to the progress made by Hillsboro during the terms of service represented by the former officers.

O. Phelps, mayor who retired after 14 years of service to the city, expressed his appreciation for the co-operation of citizens, business men and fellow councilmen. Patterson cited Phelps' work in developing Shute park as particularly outstanding in introducing the former mayor.

C. E. Wells, councilman for 10 years, called attention to the necessity of maintaining municipal credit. He also lauded Phelps for his loyalty and devotion to the city. Thomas County, councilman for six years, was brief in his remarks, while Jake Weil, councilman for two years, urged citizens to take an active interest in council activities.

Wives of the councilmen were introduced by Patterson as the long suffering women who wait up for all their husbands to finish council arguments and who had to listen to one-sided debates on ordinances and issues at the breakfast table.

J. H. Garrett, new mayor, was introduced and called attention to the many activities of Phelps and his willingness to serve the city. He outlined progress in obtaining a federal air base in Hillsboro.
