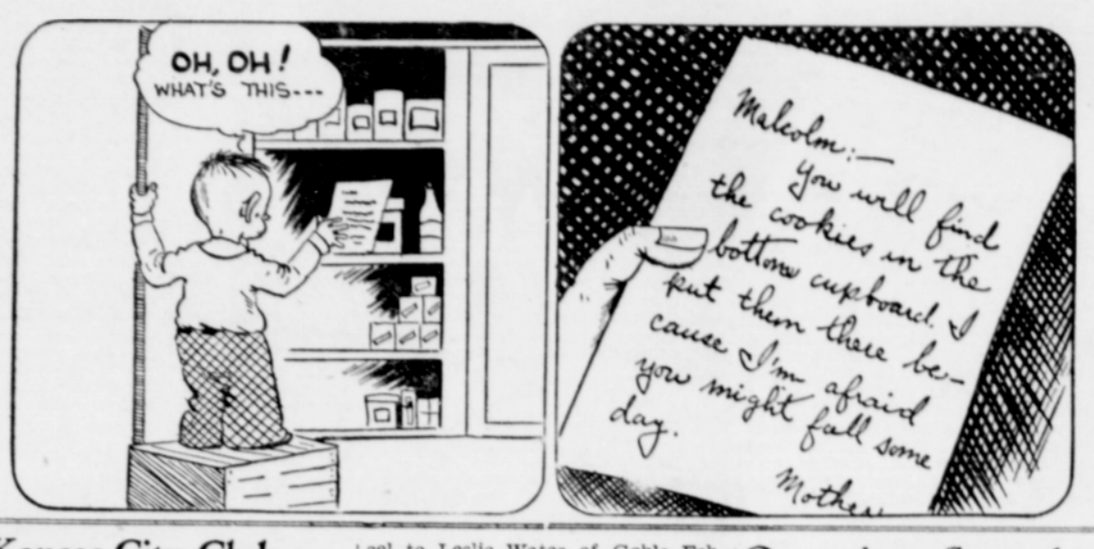
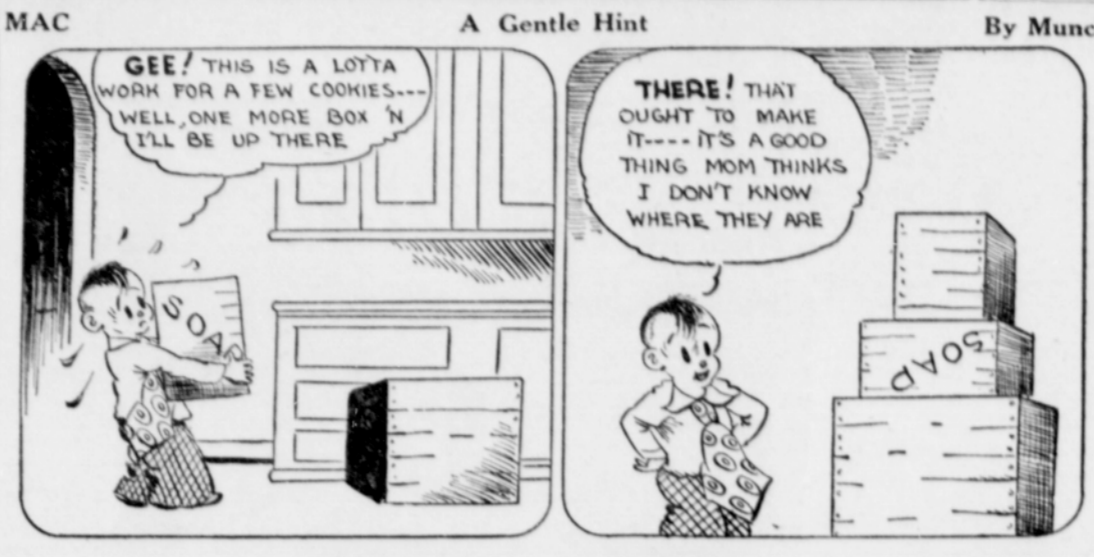

Steady Ads Bring Results

CENTRAL Savings Bank, at Broadway and 73rd street, New York City, has been carrying on an advertising campaign for the last six years. A few weeks ago President August Zinsser announced that since the campaign began the people of New York have opened approximately 250,000 accounts and deposited more than \$375,000,000.

Smaller banks might cast an envious eye at that record. But as a matter of fact, it has been achieved not by a huge advertising appropriation, but by consistent use of small space. Every week for 313 consecutive weeks—and still continuing—the bank used a 6-inch newspaper space one column wide with a straightforward talk about saving. The only exceptions were anniversaries and a few special occasions, when larger space was used, but with the same style of copy and border.—The Pocketbook.
