Local Folk Visit Salem Hospital; Hear About Work

About 25 teachers and others from Hillsboro and Forest Grove, who are interested in the control of tuberculosis, visited the state tuberculosis hospital at Salem Monday. Dr. Bellinger, head of the hospital, talked about the use of the tuberculin test in the schools as a method of finding those who had been exposed to contagion and thus checking the spread of disease in the child and also finding the source of the infection. He stated that X-ray pictures would show the presence of tuberculosis from 2 to 3 years before any of the more commonly recognized symptoms of the disease manifested themselves. He showed a number of X-ray pictures of school children which depicted the various stages of infection and stated that teamwork between teachers, parents and doctors would aid materially in checking the spread of this disease.
