## Rev. C. Amling Local Speaker

Third in Series of Lenten  
Services Here Tonight

Rev. C. Amling of Olympia, Wash. will speak at Lenten devotional services conducted tonight (Thursday) at the Hillhi auditorium by Lutheran churches. Pastor Amling is a member of the Oregon and Washington district mission board of the Lutheran Missouri Synod.

Rev. E. Hinrichs of Blooming preached on "Jesus in Gethsemane" last week. Referring to a painting on the Lord's passion by the German artist Heinrich von Hofmann entitled "Not My Will But Thine Be Done," the speaker explained: "The Savior kneels upright and unsupported on the top of a huge boulder. His countenance is pale, and worn and his entire frame is restless with anguish. But from his haggard face eyes clear and unfringed look upward. They are fixed upon a chalice. His outstretched hands are about to receive. The chalice is reached to Him by an angel, whose face is turned away from it in terror, for it is filled with the wrath of God, that has been incurred by the sin of mankind."

"Sin" is a word too small for the vocabulary of those wise in modern philosophy and modern religion," Rev. Hinrichs continued. "They displace it by the resounding phrase 'imperfection' that still clings to man in this advanced stage of development' and hesitate to designate 'good citizens' and 'respectable families' as sinners. But according to the scriptures, sin is inborn in the very nature of man and manifests itself in the heart and in the life of every individual. It is rebellion against the holy laws which the Creator has ordained for the well being of the race, and by which the curse of eternal death rests upon the transgressor."

"Jesus saw in that cup all the holy curses that rested upon all sins and upon all sinners mixed together in one bitter draught and prayed that, if it were possible, the cup might pass from Him. Yet He gladly submitted to the eternal will of the Father, and in behalf of man's redemption, drained the cup to the very last drop."

Lutheran a capella chorus sang "Go to Dark Gethsemane" in the arrangement of Redhead and Gabriel's "Thy Will Be Done." Mrs. E. Hinrichs sang "Gethsemane" by Mary Turner Salter, accompanied by Miss Esther Meyer.
