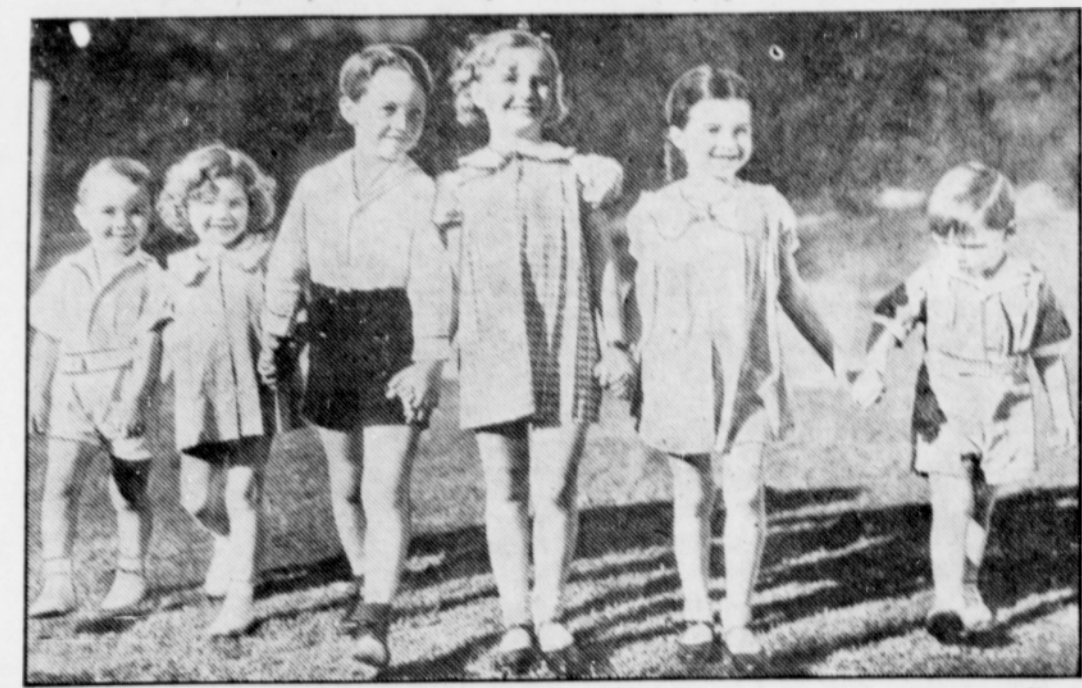

### ON OREGON FARMS

**Spray for "Red Berry" Advised**  
MEDFORD—Spraying of blackberries and Youngberries with liquid lime sulfur—one gallon to 12 gallons of water—before the buds break open as a means of controlling the "red berry" disease is advised by County Agent L. P. Wilcox. This so-called "disease" is in reality caused by a small mite, he says, which works its way into the buds during the bloom period and injures the berries, causing them to remain red in color and fall to mature, resulting in severe crop losses. He suggests that in communities where wild blackberries are harvested it would be well to make some community effort to spray the vines.
