D.A.R. Leader Cites Woman's Importance

That American womanhood is the greatest factor for world peace today was the declaration of Mrs. John Y. Richardson, junior, president of the Daughters of the American Revolution, in her address at the 15th annual business and professional women's relations dinner at the local chamber of commerce last evening. The banquet was the feature event of the National Business Women's week here.

Organized, educated and progressive American women can take the leadership in making the world peace-minded, Mrs. Richardson stated. This may be accomplished in the home by fostering a spirit of peace and good-will toward other nations.

Women have made tremendous strides in taking their place in public life, the speaker declared. She traced the progress of women during the past 65 years, citing how they had taken their places in education, legislature, in the foreign service and in other positions of trust. Women have achieved these successes through merit and have retained their womanliness. Thursday afternoon women should justify the trust and opportunities given them by giving careful thought to citizenship as Mrs. Richardson's plea. Two other suffragette groups have not given sufficient thought to public affairs and have been too easily led.

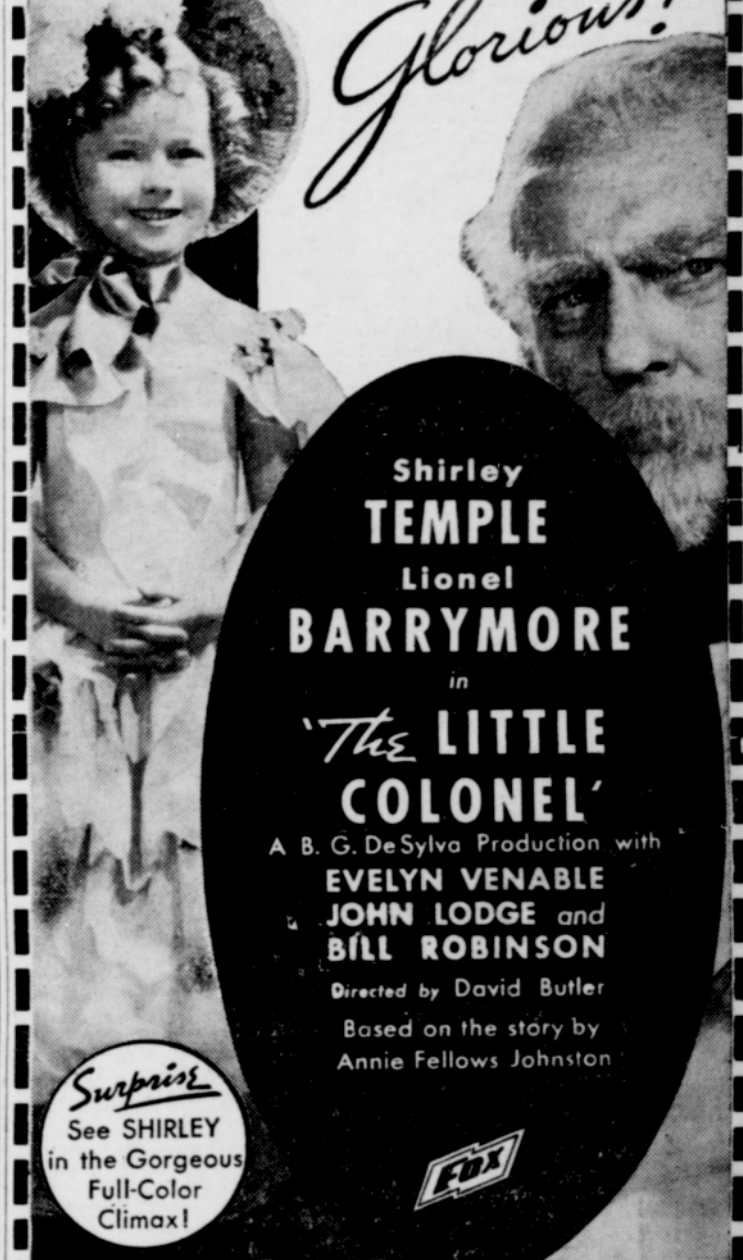
