## Rev. Schaus Speaks Here

### Schefflin Pastor Speaker Fourth Lenten Service

Rev. P. H. Schaus of Schefflin will speak during the Lenten devotional at the Hillbii auditorium tonight at 8 o'clock. His subject will be "Christ Before the Roman Court."

Rev. Schaus has served the pastorate of Zion Lutheran church near Schefflin for the past 16 years. In 1932 he represented Lutheran churches of the state at the general convention of the Lutheran Missouri Synod in Milwaukee, Wis. Two years ago he was elected second vice-president of the Oregon and Washington district of his denomination.

Sermon of Rev. C. Amling of Olympia, Wash., last week was well received. Speaking of the trial of Jesus before the court of God the "Passion History" word mean nothing to man. If he were merely a man, even though he were the greatest among the prophets, the wisest among the wise, and the most exemplary among all good men, we could only admire him or pity him. We could never comfort ourselves when sin and death beset us. Only because he is the incarnate Son of God, does the "blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, cleanse us from all sin."

### Kitzmiller Beaten by Hall in Coulter Headliner

Bill Hall, Aberdeen grappler, took the measure of George Kitzmiller of Portland in the main event of last Thursday's wrestling card. Kitzmiller opened the battle by taking the first fall in 17 minutes with a double hammerlock but Hall evened the count in short order with a body press. A headlock and a body press seven minutes later gave Hall the match.

Semi-windup went to Jack Stewart of Portland when he took two out of three falls from Bill Avery of Eugene. Stewart copped the first with a body-scissors and wristlock in 14 minutes. Avery then opened up with shoulder-butts and took the second fall in seven minutes with an Indian death lock.

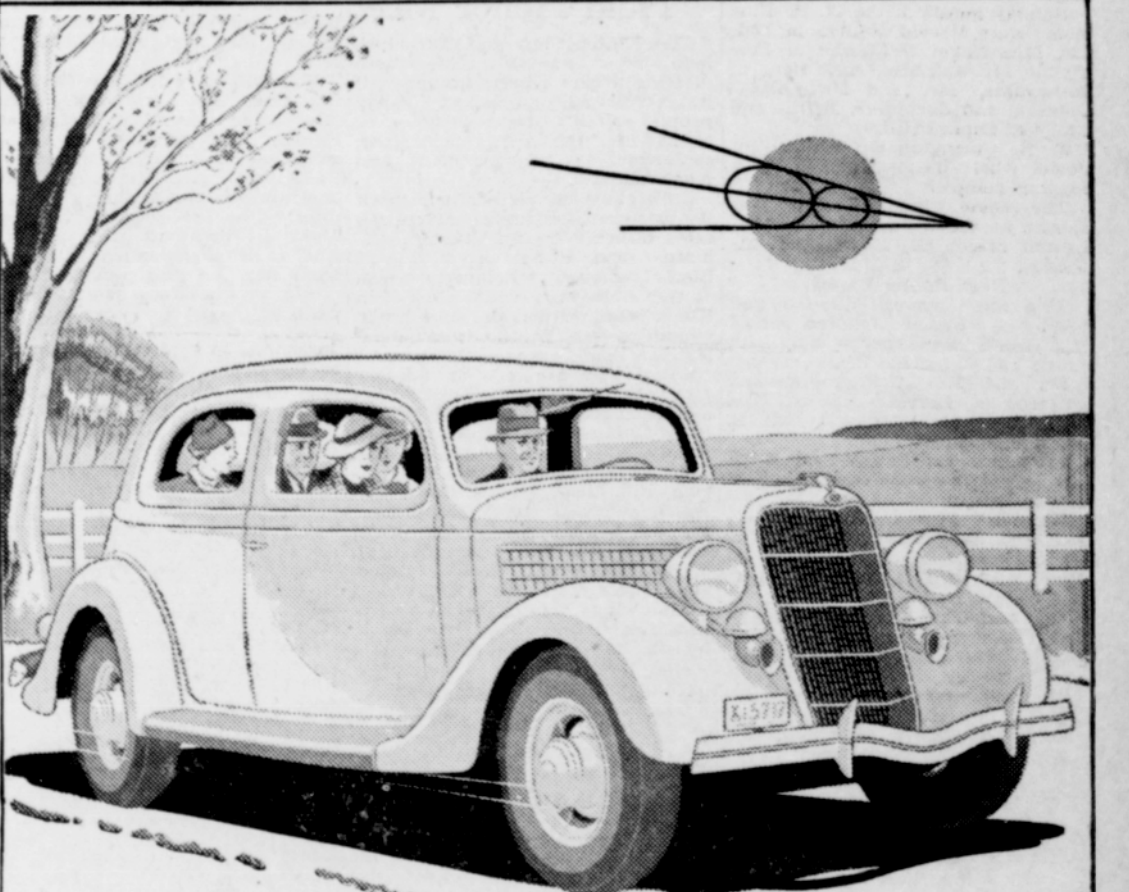
**Outstanding Sire**  
Outstanding registered Guernsey bull calf was purchased recently by Carl Trachsel, Reedville dairyman, from the Middle Guesney dairy at Ridgefield, Wash. This is the second sire from this herd to come to Washington county, the other being owned by Oscar Pfahl of Cornelius.

Both of these bulls are sired by "Aiyukpa L. Sheik," a first prize winner at the Pacific International Livestock exposition and regarded as one of the best bred bulls west of the Mississippi river. Four world record cows are listed among his seven best females. Dam of Trachsel's bull has made 123.8 pounds of butterfat in 66 days in class CC for four-year-olds.

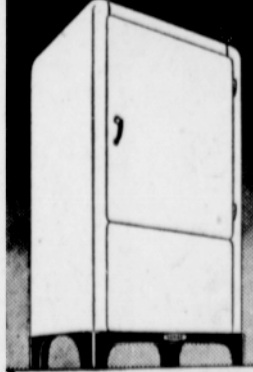
