Thrip Control Plan Outlined by Cyrus

(Continued from page one) nicotine sulphate added also apparently did as much as could be expected. Thorough and prompt application is one of the most essential parts of an effective control program.

Permission to exceed the total wheat acreage allowed by the contracts for 1935 by permitting more spring wheat to be planted does not materially affect the Washington county wheat contract signer. Due to weather conditions last fall many wheat contract signers did not get their minimum acreage seeded. This only means that where the total acreage for 1935 is less than this required minimum, signers will not receive the full 1935 benefit payment.

To receive full payments farmers need to seed spring wheat to make up this deficiency if there is any. There is not any penalty other than loss of benefit payments for failure to plant the minimum acreage.

Granting the privilege of seeding wheat in excess of their minimum depends upon the farmer signing an agreement to make a proportionate reduction in his 1936 crop if he should be called upon to do so. Instructions from the wheat administration in Washington very clearly indicate that it will still be necessary for the farmer to have the required amount of contracted acres and that the permitted use of these contracted acres will conform to those uses outlined last fall and a copy of which was mailed to every wheat contract signer in Washington county early in October.
