Rev. G. Reule Talks Tonight

Last Lutheran Lenten Meet Hilhi Auditorium

The Rev. G. Reule, local Lutheran pastor, will conduct the last Lenten devotional of this season at the Hilhi auditorium tonight (Thursday). His subject will be "Golgotha." Pastor Reule is at the present time also serving as radio speaker for the Lutheran broadcast on Sunday afternoons over K. E. X. The Rev. E. Eichmann of Port-

land spoke to the Lutherans last week on "The Via Dolorosa." Referring to various events that transpired on "the way to Golgo-tha" the speaker said, "the man of sorrows bears His cross in weakness and helplessness over the 'Via Dolorosa.' In the past twelve hours He had been dragged from one judgment seat to another, merci-lessly scourged and abused; no rest, no sleep, no food. Now the weight of the rough cross presses down on His bruised and bleeding back and causes his frail body to fail, stagger, and apparently collapse.
"The daughters of Jerusalem, who

accompany the multitude that fol-lowed Him, could see in Him no malefactor worthy of crucifixion; and they gave vent to their sor-row in lamentation and tears. They thought Him a most benevo-lent man, worthy of their sincerlent man, worthy of their sincerest sympathy, but they failed to perceive the true purpose of His journey to Golgotha; they failed to acknowledge Him as the Savior sent by God. For this Jesus reproached them, 'Weep not for me; but weep for yourselves.' In the darkest hour of His humiliation He thinks not of Himself but of those He had come to redeem. He wants no external sympathy and wants no external sympathy and compassion; He wants tears of repentance which say; "It was my transgression which brought this woe on Thee."


