Mumps Spreading, Says County Nurse

Mumps are spreading and in too many cases are being laughed at or ignored, according to Miss Margaret Dixon, county health nurse. Because of the comic appearance of a swollen and distorted face there is a tendency to forget the more serious aspects of the disease, she says.

"Interest in far reaching programs which deal with the wiping out of T. B. is commendable but it does not excuse us from shutting our eyes to the less spectacular 'childhood' diseases," states Miss Dixon.

"The Oregon state laws place responsibility equally upon parent, teacher and physician. Indeed anyone knowing of the existence of such a disease not under the care of a licensed doctor is required to report the same to the local health officer."

"Dr. J. B. Dinmore is county health officer for Washington county and Hillsboro, Dr. Fred S. Richards for Forest Grove and Dr. C. E. Mason for Beaverton."

"If necessary precautions are not observed which will protect all other persons of the vicinity, the entire family may be quarantined for a period of two weeks from the time that the last swelling appears upon the last jaw of the last member of the family."
