The slip may have either a square or round neckline, and can be trimmed with lace, if desired. The panties are cut in one with the waist, to which they button in the back. Patterns come in sizes 2 to 10 years. Size 6 calls for 4 1/2 yards of ruffling or lace for trimming. Batiste, nainsook, or long cloth can be used. A smart jumper frock that would delight the heart of any girl is that presented as Pattern 439. It has a panel from shoulder to hem in back only, the front scene offering variety by a simple line, which may be a closing or only simulated. Woolen or satin should be used for the jumper, with batiste or silk for the blouse. Patterns are sized 11 to 19 (29 to 37 bust). Size 17 calls for 2 1/2 yards of 54-inch fabric for the jumper and 1 1/2 yards for the short-sleeved blouse, or 2 3/4 yards with long sleeves.

To the visitor, the pressroom of a newspaper is perhaps its most interesting department. To the business man who spends his good money for advertising space, it's a vital spot. Before the Audit Bureau of Circulations (A. B. C.) was established, 21 years ago, doors to pressrooms were generally plastered with signs that shouted: "No Admittance" - "Keep Out - This Means YOU."

But in an infrequent and rare case when a questioning advertiser doubted a circulation statement claimed Missouri for his home, and said "Show me," there was a way to show him. The little automatic counter, for instance, which is affixed to presses could be made to do as many tricks as a paddle wheel at a old-time carnival.

Publishers printing more than 80 per cent of the newspapers circulated in the United States have no pressroom secrets. There's no inviolable department secreted behind locked pressroom doors among newspapers that are A. B. C. members.

When the A. B. C. auditor comes in to inspect and report on circulation figures, his impartial findings reveal HOW MUCH PAID circulation - WHERE it is distributed - HOW it is secured.

How many papers are printed is secondary in importance, even if the total number of copies run off the press happens to agree with the circulation claim. The A. B.
