

## Dust Storms, Prevalent in Recent Years, Group Holds Are Grim Portent to Farmer



In the scene above, soil "transplanted" by heavy winds nearly conceals outbuildings on a South Dakota farm. Below, a recent Kansas City street scene, when a great dust storm brought dusk in midafternoon.. The Kansas City woman above, right, is not grieving; she's simply trying to keep from breathing choking dust par-

plowing ground the subsoil into powder. Lack of rain did the rest. Hot winds blew over the farmlands, and swept topsoil into dunes on neighboring lands. Eddying winds whirled the soil high into the air, depositing it in far-away states.

But soil conditions are not alone responsible. Statistics show that, over the last 25 years, there has been a steady decline in amount of rainfall. Other research has revealed that periods of heavy precipitation occur in cycles.

So there is the hope that soon the trend toward lighter rainfalls may be reversed; that instead of muttering morosely. "It ain't gonna rain no mo'," farmers will begin "singing in the rain," and that midwestern farm soil will shun its nomadic career and settle down, for a time at

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
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
