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Morning Glory Control Cited

Use of sodium chlorate in the control of Canadian Thistle and morning glory has brought good results, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. The chlorate treatment is best used on plots of twenty square rods or less. For plots larger than this the cost of chemical treatment is too high and cultivation is a more satisfactory method for control.

It is particularly important that spring applications be made on land that is flooded in the winter making fall treatment impractical. Applications of sodium chlorate now at the rate of three to five pounds per square rod will check the summer growth and spread of underground root systems.

Chlorate should be applied in the dry form and should be put out as soon as possible in order that the remaining spring rains will have ample opportunity to wash it well into the ground and around the roots. The treatment should extend two feet beyond the edge of the patch in order to catch any underground runners.

Sodium chlorate is very poisonous. Consequently, livestock should not be allowed to pasture over a treated area until there has been sufficient rain to wash the chemical into the ground. Considerable caution should be exercised to keep fire away from the chlorate because it is very inflammable.
