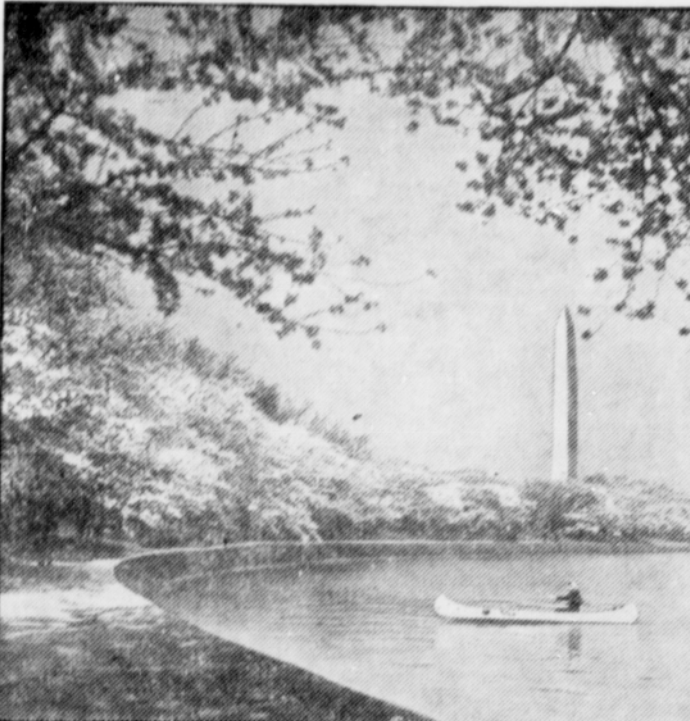

Sprays and Bait Advised for Slugs

Garden slugs are beginning to attack the vegetables, states L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. Effective control can be secured by the use of a Bordeaux spray on the plants and a poison bait.

Bait recommended is a pound of chopped lettuce leaves mixed well with one-ounce of calcium arsenate. This bait should be prepared in the evening and scattered along the rows.

Slugs will continue migrating into the gardens so it is necessary to employ control measures as long as they are present he said. The presence of slugs can be readily detected by the chewed leaves of plants and the shiny trails of dried slime which they leave on the ground around the plants.

This and other control measures for garden pests are found in extension bulletin 463, "Vegetable
