Business Gain Seen by Index

An unseasonal gain in electric power production and a 39.4 per cent expansion in bank debits combined to lift the Commonwealth index of Portland business for March to 71.47, against 65.05 for February. It was announced by the April issue of Commonwealth, Inc. Business Survey. Oregon industrial activity continued on about the same level as in February though lumber improved temporarily when prices showed signs of stiffening. Generally, business was slightly improved over February though definite signs of a substantial spring upturn were not yet evident.

Spring business in Oregon, said Business Survey, depends largely on the course of building and lumber and on a solution of the wheat situation. Lumber prices continue weak and some mills threaten shut-down unless they improve shortly. Since it is yet early and eastern weather has not been favorable to building, the real test is yet to come.

The wheat outlook is reported as clouded by lack of adequate markets. The new crop year should see a 15 million bushel carryover and the new Pacific Northwest crop may reach 80 millions. This means at least 40 million bushels must be sold outside the Pacific coast if surplus is to be avoided.

Major current trouble, says David Eccles, editor of Business Survey, is that business spends too much time watching statistics and Washington and not enough looking for business. He points out that automobile sales are up 25 per cent from last year and radio and refrigerator sales are touching new highs. He credits this to aggressive sales and advertising efforts of manufacturers of these commodities.

Hard work and moderation are declared by Mrs. Sain, 89-year-old pioneer and native daughter, to be the cause of her long life and present good health. Active and in robust health, she does all her own housework, cooks three meals a day for three people in addition to raising canary birds and flowers as a hobby. Mrs. Sain will have lived to the ripe old age of 90 years next September 20 and has lived in Washington county for 77 years. She was born in Dayton, Yamhill county, and when 12 years of age moved with her parents to a donation land claim in Patton valley, three miles from Gaston. At the age of 20, she married and moved to Scoggins valley. Mr. and Mrs. Sain lived in a log cabin after their marriage and in later years built two houses, the last in which she now resides. One large barn was burned a few years back and replaced. Mrs. Sain is active and in good health and has never been ill a day in her life. She has the St. Andrews strain of canary birds, of which her pride and joy are a pair of white ones. She has one son living with her and doing the farming on their 200-acre farm. One daughter in Portland, one in McMinnville and one in Kelso, all of whom, and her grandchildren were home for Easter.
