Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, 92, Laid to Rest Monday

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN--Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, 92, died April 27 at her home on Chehalem Mountain.

She was born August 8, 1842, in Henry county, Iowa, and crossed the plains in 1853 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Shuck. They settled on a donation land claim at Middletown. Miss Elizabeth Shuck and William Jones were married August 16, 1859. They lived for three years in East Portland, moving from there to Chehalem Center, where they remained until 1879 when they took up their abode at Fernwood. Mrs. Jones and youngest son moved to Chehalem Mountain in 1892, where she had resided continuously until her death.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones were the parents of 13 children, Jim and Irene, deceased; Charles of Newberg; Frank of Forest Grove; Tom of Chehalem Mountain; Lee and Dave, deceased; Sam of Washougal, Wash.; Anna McCormick of Newberg; Elsie Ornduff, Brad and Wilbur of Chehalem Mountain, and Jane McKern of Newberg. She leaves 48 grandchildren, 54 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

Funeral services were held at the Charles Hodson Mortuary Monday afternoon with interment in Mt. Olive cemetery. Laurel, Wallace Jones, a grandson, and Ebery Parrish officiated. Six grandsons acted as pallbearers.

Mrs. Jones joined the Christian church in her girlhood. She was the last survivor of a family of five daughters, all well known in and around the Chehalem Valley. They were Mrs. Jane Heater, Mrs. Susie Hash, Mrs. Sarah Ann Deskins and Mrs. Margaret Hayes.
