Size 44 requires 4 1/2 yards of 32 or 35-inch fabric plus 1/4 yard contrast. A gray addition to any wardrobe is this easy-to-slip-into frock, Pattern 503. It buttons at the waistline in front, and tricky pockets, cuffs, and belt stitched in rows conform with the tailored collar. This model is attractive in gingham, percale, or chambray. Patterns are sized 14 to 20 and 22 to 42. Size 18 requires 4 1/2 yards of 39-inch fabric.
