The 8A class won the prize for having the best decorated room during the past month. The first grade room at the David Hill school was judged the most attractive.

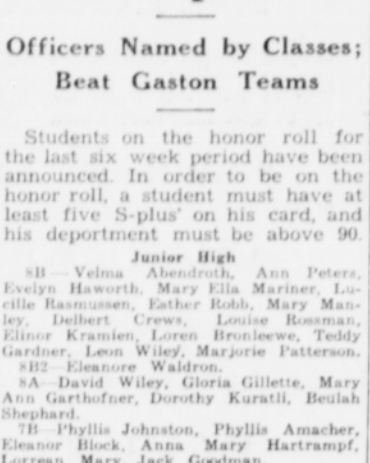

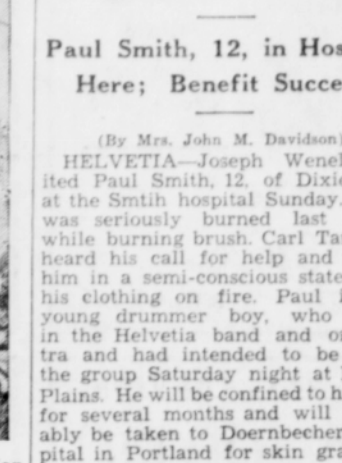
### Sewell Gets Contract Landscaping 54 Houses
