Pioneer Woman Dies Friday After Long Illness

Mrs. Melissa J. Jackson, 88, Oregon pioneer of 1857 and resident of this county for many years, died in Portland Friday after a long illness. Funeral services were held at the Forest Grove Congregational church Sunday afternoon with Rev. E. D. Kellogg officiating. Interment was in the Banks cemetery.

Mrs. Jackson was born at Red Bud, Ill., March 17, 1847, and came to Oregon in 1857. She is survived by the following children: Mrs. C. B. Taylor, Ellis Purdin, Banks, Edmund M., Walter H., Austin W., Miles C., Charles W., and Otis K., Portland. Three sisters, Mrs. Ellen Vickers of Cornelius, Mrs. Emma Ford of Hillsboro, and Mrs. Millie Shearer of Birkenfeld, also survive.

She made her home for some time with her daughter, Mrs. Taylor, of near Roy, and lived in Hillsboro for many years.

(Continued from page one) Four representatives and two senators out of office for having accepted other state and federal appointments and has cast a cloud over the right of several other lawmakers to their seats. Already two legislators have resigned their boards in order to satisfy the constitutional inhibition—Senator Fisher as a member of the bonus commission and Senator Steiwer as county agent for the same commission. Senator Walker of Polk county denies that he ever accepted appointment to the state library board, although he has attended one meeting. Representatives Lew Wallace and Johnson of Multnomah have attacked the opinion in the courts and Governor Martin is advising everybody to "sit tight" and let the legislature itself decide who is entitled to a seat when that time comes.

Merchants who deal in electrical equipment and supplies must register with the state bureau of labor on or before July 1 under an act passed by the last legislature. The registration fee is \$1. Not only must the merchants register but the new law requires that all electrical appliances offered for sale must conform to the requirements of the state electrical code.

Violations of traffic laws cost 101 Oregon motorists their operators' licenses during April, according to reports filed with the state department. Sixty-four of the 101 were for violations and 20 for reckless driving and speeding. The report indicates a tightening up of traffic law enforcement both on the part of the police and the courts.

Federal Man Cites Control of Rodents

(Continued from page one) opening should again be closed. Large clouds are best used for closing the hole in order to prevent dirt dropping into the main tunnel and covering up the bait. Poison grains are not satisfactory in the control of gophers, since the gopher lives entirely upon roots, tubers and green feed. The field mouse very often works in the tunnel of the mole and generally does considerable of the damage which the mole is blamed for. Field mice are generally found in gardens and grain fields and their work can be best detected by the small open entrances to their tunnels. They can be controlled by use of a poison grain bait in which one ounce of grain bait in which one ounce of strychnine is mixed with two quarts of thin starch paste and added to a bushel of rolled oats. This bait can be placed around the openings to the burrows or set under boards that have been raised slightly to permit the field mice to get under them.
