### Quick Freezing Progress Cited

#### Cannery Official Speaks at Rotary Luncheon

Development of the Birds-Eye quick freezing process in the local cannery was outlined briefly at the Rotary luncheon Thursday by Arthur Relling, vice-president of the Ray-Maling company. This is the only plant of its kind on the coast. The process, he said, was started here in 1929 and the production has been increased three times since then.

Relling declared that much progress had been made in the manufacturing and selling of the quick frozen product, citing changes which insured wider distribution. He feels that the consumer has accepted the product. Stocks are depleted and they have orders for shipment for four carloads, not now packed.

Largest quick frozen pack now is the green pea, while at first it was thought strawberries would be the biggest seller, according to Relling. He stated that quick freezing of fryers had now been started after several years of experimentation.

Big end of the work here is the quick freezing, declared Relling. Regular canning, he predicted, would be about the same as last year.
