The series of meetings at the Church of Christ conducted by Teddy Leavitt, evangelist, closed Sunday night. Attendance at Sunday school in the morning was 90.

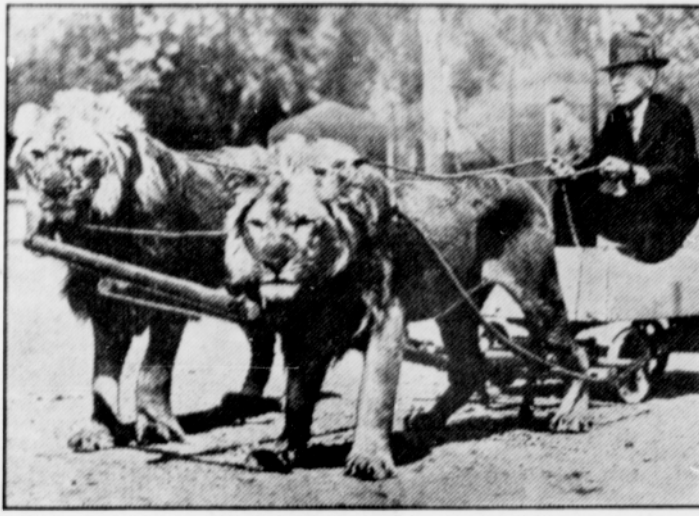
