

PORTLAND SERVICE GETS SECOND U.P. STREAMLINER



The Union Pacific's No. 2 Streamliner, the world's fastest, longdistance, Pullman-equipped, passenger train which several months ago set two world's records for speed and broke two American transcontinental records in its run from Los Angeles to New York City, is to go into regular service between Chicago and Portland, Oregon, in the next few weeks, according to a joint announcement of the Union Pacific System and the Chicago & North Western Railway. The train will have a schedule of approximately 40 hours. It consists of seven cars including three sleeping cars, a diner-lounge and coach-buffet car. It is powered with a 1200 horsepower, 16 cylinder, V-type, 2-cycle Diesel engine, the largest, single-unit engine of the kind ever applied to railroad passenger service.
