Richard Abts, of next year's Hillsboro senior class, and prominent member of the high school track team, was unanimously chosen as next year's president of Hillsboro Christian Council at a joint meeting of this year's and next year's council members Thursday evening at Pilgrim House, council headquarters. Abts, who is a member of Omega chapter, will succeed J. Robert Patterson in the presidential chair, and though taking office with the opening of the new school year, will be formally inaugurated in connection with the celebration of the tenth anniversary of the organization of the first club during the fourth week in September.
