

Damage Action Filed in Court

Many Motorists Draw Fines Traffic Law Charges

Damages totaling \$5000 are sought in a suit filed Friday by Joseph Olin against Carlson & Sherk company of Sherwood. The plaintiff alleges in his complaint that he suffered injuries to his right arm, side and back as a result of an accident between his car and one owned by the Sherwood company at the intersection of the Clipse and Sherwood-Tualatin roads on April 15.

Drivers against motorists who failed to observe highway stop signs in Forest Grove last week netted five violators. E. C. Blasey and Hugh L. Weik of Portland, Lee Marshall and R. N. Baker of Forest Grove, and John Jackson of Hillsboro were summoned before the local justice of the peace and fined \$5 and costs each.

Robert C. Brown of Hillsboro and J. W. Hartman of Forest Grove pleaded guilty to charges of speeding with trucks and were fined \$5 and costs. The fine was suspended in the case of Hartman. Earl R. Anderson of Cornelius was fined \$2 and costs last week on a charge of having no muffler on his car, while George S. Zimmerman of Yamhill pleaded guilty to a charge of having improper lights and paid a fine of \$5 and costs. Jack Haston of Portland, arrested May 25 on a drunken driving charge following an auto accident at Aloha, was fined \$100 in the local justice court last week and sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. His operator's license was also revoked.

Lew E. Cornell of Huber was bound over to the grand jury Monday following arraignment before Donald T. Templeton, county judge, on an assault and battery charge. Two Banks residents were brought into the local justice of peace court Wednesday for traffic law violations. F. W. Shearer pleaded guilty to a charge of having no clearance lights on his truck and received a suspended fine of \$10 and costs. Dorman M. Moehnk was fined \$5 and costs for failure to have a muffler on his motorcycle.

(Continued from page one) company. Other firms bidding on these articles included the American Rubber company, Munnell-Sherill company, Eureka Fire Hose company and Sanderson Supply company. The latter firm was given an order for 42 safety helmets to protect firemen from falling beams and bricks during fires.

Amendment to the "firecracker" ordinance authorized the city council to give permission to sell fireworks in areas other than Shute park or the fire zone to the person or persons managing the Fourth of July celebration or their agents. Sales will not be permitted within 50 feet of any building and "spit-devils," "cherry bombs," and sky-rockets may not be sold according to the ordinance. Following the passage of the amendment, the council designated the Hillsboro Fire Department, Inc., as the organization to which the right to sell fireworks would be granted for 1935.

That conversations with the Oregon-Washington Water Service company officials indicated that the utility would not consider a compromise of the approximately \$5000 in unpaid fire hydrant rentals was reported given by P. L. Patterson, city attorney, the matter was temporarily laid on the table pending further investigation. Hydrant rentals have not been paid by the city for more than five years on the contention that the fireighting pressure provided did not comply with the company's franchise.

Proposal by Councilman M. H. Stevenson that a portion of the street lights in the city be turned off during the summer months was approved by the council. George McGee, city manager, reported that similar action last year resulted in a savings of approximately one-third to the city.

The board of directors, consisting of chairmen of the various county committees, was announced as follows: J. E. Lewton, Washington county; Thiessen, Clackamas county; R. W. Hogarth, Polk county; Gill, Multnomah county; William Punstion, Clatsop county; John Shield, Tillamook county; H. E. Lofkey, Marion county; and Zimmerman, Yamhill county. Board members from Lincoln and Columbia counties were not named during the meeting.

Resolution to the effect that delegates would return to their respective counties and urge immediate steps for organization of power districts was adopted. Another resolution placed the meeting on record as endorsing the Grange Power bill if sponsored again this year.

Notice from the county dog control board in regard to cancellation of the city's contract to collect dog license fees was presented by the city attorney. Councilmen inquired of the board as to the cancellation on the ground that the city had made a diligent canvass of the town in collecting the licenses.
