Possible Industry Talked at Rotary

Possible establishment of an industrial plant here that would utilize the waste products of farm, cannery and forest was discussed by A. C. Forrester of Portland at the Rotary club luncheon last Thursday. It was also attended by the county delegation from Hillsboro. The industrial alcohol would be used in internal combustion engines of automobiles and farm machinery. George McGee, city manager, was chairman. Plans are already drawn up for the plant here, according to Forrester, who said it would employ 40 persons and indirectly 4000. It has the endorsement of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, he said. He asked local people to pledge use in their motor fuel 10 per cent blend of industrial alcohol, made from Washington county agricultural products. Considerable interest was shown and a spirit of cooperation exhibited.

Walnut Men Plan Code Conference

Conference to determine what is to be done with the walnut control code in Oregon has been called in Portland for June 22, according to an announcement this week by Frank Rowell of Scholls, chairman of the Associated Walnut Growers of Oregon. 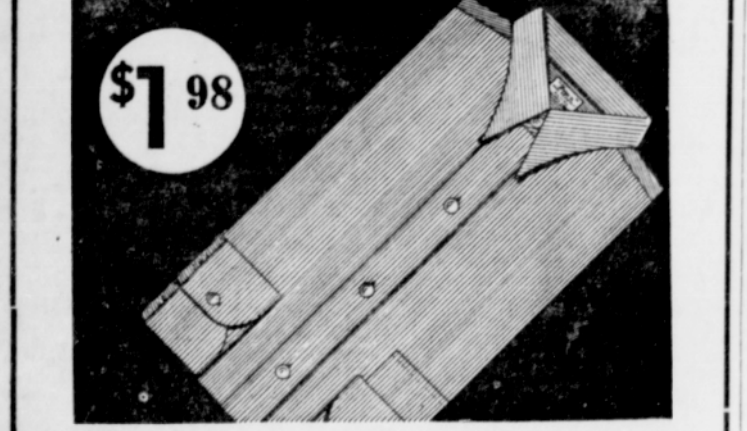
