law. This act permits purchasers to pay not less than 20 per cent of the price at the time of sale and to pay off the balance over a period of 10 years at six per cent interest.

That cities would be required to protect their interests at the county sale was the announcement made by the district attorney's office. Municipalities having improvement liens against tracts involved will have 20 days after a bid is received for a certain parcel of land in which to meet the offer. Otherwise the successful bidders will receive title to the property clear of liens. If no bids are received, cities will be given an opportunity to purchase tracts on which they have liens for the amount of the county taxes involved.

During the period between the close of the sheriff's sale and the county auction, property owners may redeem tracts for the amount of the judgment, the district attorney stated.

Sheriff's sale opened May 18 and until the time it closed 296 tracts were sold and approximately \$40,000 realized by the county. Total of 2200 certificates of delinquency were issued November 10, 1934, by the sheriff and approximately 1328 properties were listed in the foreclosure complaint filed December 29, 1934. Foreclosure order was issued against more than 900 tracts on May 18 of this year.
