Special Work in Schools of City Urged by Group

Resolutions favoring the establishment of a room for children requiring special instruction and a kindergarten as a part of the Hillsboro school system were passed at Parent-Teacher association sponsored meeting in the chamber of commerce rooms last Wednesday night. Representatives of other groups in the city were present at the invitation of the P. T. A. group.

Value of such work in the schools was recommended by Dr. Louis Martin, head of special education in the Portland schools and psychologist for child guidance clinic. He declared that in the schools of the nation there were 10,000,000 children in need of special education, many of whom will become economic and social liabilities and who might otherwise through special education work make a real contribution to society.

Dr. Martin said we were too much inclined to look at the schools in the light of the three R's, whereas extra-curricular activities are just as important or more so than the regular school work in the personality adjustment of the child. Great importance of reading to the child in all his school work was cited by the speaker.

One room for special education work in a system the size of this was recommended by Dr. Martin, who said it should be given over to the emotionally unstable and those somewhat retarded. He declared it was poor economy for a school system to neglect these children.

Referring to the kindergarten, Dr. Martin said there were fewer failures among children who have such training and that they make better adjustments to the school situation.

A brief report of the school financial situation was made by Chairman M. P. Cady of the school board in answer to a request as to how the board would stand on the proposed program.

He said all teachers were being prepared for this type of work now. Willingness of the board to co-operate within its means was expressed.

A P. T. A. committee to represent the association and aid the school board, wherever possible, in establishment of facilities for child education, includes Mrs. L. C. Kramlen, Mrs. Fritz Abendroth, Mrs. Will McDonald, Rev. Charles Reed and Jake Weil.
