Federal Power Commission Gives Electric Rate Report

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 17.—The Federal Power Commission today issued a report on electric rates prevailing in Oregon for residential customers. The report shows typical bills in all communities in the state as of January 1, 1935, includes rates charged by 22 private utility companies and 8 municipal utilities.

A total of 171 communities are included in Table 1 in an alphabetical arrangement for easy reference. Table 2 of the report shows 57 of these communities arranged according to size of the bills, from lowest to highest, for 25, 100 and 250 kilowatt-hours.

Indicating how wide is the spread between the lowest and highest charges for the same quantity of energy the following condensed tabulation is presented for three major groups of communities:

Table with 4 columns: Kilowatt. Hours, Lowest Bills, Amt., Highest Bills. Rows include Eugene, Klamath Falls and Medford, Astoria, etc.

This report for Oregon is one of Rate Series 2 of the Electric Rate survey, which when completed will include each of the 48 states. These reports are on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at 10 cents each.

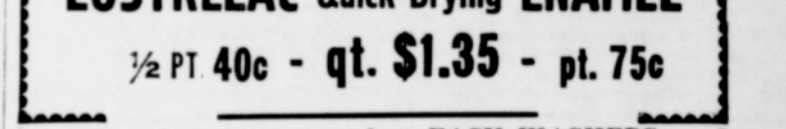

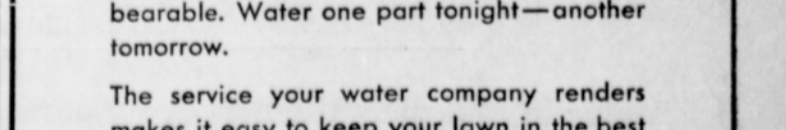
