Two Oregon breeders of registered Holstein-Friesian cattle are the owners of four cows which appear on the honor list of high producing Holsteins, according to a report recently published by The Holstein-Friesian Association of America at Madison, Wis.

J. A. Lindow & Sons at Bethany have three cows on the list in the 10-months division, class B work. Lone Fir Princess, a seven-year-old cow, made 741.9 pounds of fat and 1880.4 pounds milk to rank fifth in a group of 100 competing records.

Lone Fir Inka Trixie, a senior three-year-old, with 555.6 pounds fat and 1867.4 pounds milk, and fourteenth place was won by Lone Fir Fannie, an eight-year-old cow, with 688.5 pounds fat and 1939.0 pounds milk.

A ten-year-old cow, Waukoma Myretta, owned by S. B. Hall at Troutdale, made 670.2 pounds fat and 2454.6 pounds milk to place first in the 10-months division, class B work.
