Unity of Townsend Groups Urged Here

can stop its realization. Misunderstanding is rampant over the principles of the plan, he said, but opponents have been unable to offer anything better.

That the Townsend plan will be passed as the first phase of the social security program was the contention of the speaker. Income taxes in the United States mounted this year as a result of the government's policy of increasing the buying power of the people, Clyde said. The Townsend plan would carry this movement to a further degree and would eventually do away with the relief rolls, he declared.

Activities aimed to take voting power away from persons on relief was attacked by Clyde. He declared that a bill proposed at the recent Oregon Legislature to prevent non-property owners from voting on bond issues was designed as an opening wedge in the campaign of special interests.

Details of the revised Townsend plan were explained by Clyde. Funds would be derived from a two per cent tax on transactions and inheritances and a 10 per cent increase in income levies. Pensions of not to exceed \$200 per month are proposed and would be paid pro-rata as funds became available.

Following Clyde's talk, the audience took a group obligation to fight for the Townsend plan.
